JULY 28

President & Vice President Nominees must accept or decline their nomination no later than 5PM within two business days. Nominees can contact the Council Secretary to receive the Accept or Decline Form.

PROCESS**

Background check process for nominees who accepted their nomination

Per the amended SRPMIC Constitution, candidates must have not been convicted of a felony during the ten (10) years preceding the date of the election. A felony is any criminal offense punishable by more than one (1) year incarceration in the jurisdiction the person was convicted.

AUG 04

Election Board certification of PRESIDENT and VICE-PRESIDENT Nominees

Certification of candidates shall be determined by the Election Board based upon the qualification of the candidates as provided in the SRPMIC Constitution, Article IV, Sec. 2

AUG 06

Election Board certification of COUNCIL MEMBER nominees

Certification of candidates shall be determined by the Election Board based upon the qualification of the candidates as provided in the SRPMIC Constitution, Article IV, Sec. 3

OCT 01

Deadline for Eligible Voters to request an Absentee Ballot for Primary Election

Eligible voters may request an absentee ballot to vote by mail. Requests can be made via phone, email, or fax by contacting the Council Secretary.

OCT 15

Deadline to make request for Home Voting for Primary Election

Eligible home voters (disabled or bedridden and within a 25 mile radius of the community boundaries) may request to have (2) Election Board Members deliver a ballot for home voting at your location. Requests can be made by contacting the Council Secretary.

OCT 20

SRPMIC PRIMARY ELECTION DAY POLLS OPEN: 6:00AM – 6:00PM

Results will be presented after Election Board tallies onsite and absentee ballots for Council certification.

ELECTION BOARD

It is the SRPMIC Election Board's goal to provide vital information to the members of the Salt River Pima-Maricopa Indian Community to ensure a positive experience with the Primary and General Election process.

WHAT IS A PRIMARY ELECTION?

A Primary Election narrows the field of candidates to determine which candidates will run in the General Election.

WHAT IS A GENERAL ELECTION?

A General Election determines which candidates are voted into office.

WHICH COUNCIL SEATS HAVE A PRIMARY & GENERAL ELECTION?

All Council Member seats, including the Offices of the President and Vice President, follow a Primary and General Election process.

DO I VOTE IN THE PRIMARY AND GENERAL ELECTION?

Yes! It is important that you vote at both the October 20, 2026 Primary Election AND the November 17, 2026 General Election.

VOTERS

VOTER ELIGIBILITY

Per Article VI, Sec. 4, any member of the Salt River Pima-Maricopa Indian Community who is at least eighteen (18) years of age may vote at any election conducted in the electoral district of which such member has been a resident for at least one (1) year or in such district in which such member is authorized to vote as a non-resident member as may be enacted by ordinance by the Community Council, **unless**

- a member is a prisoner in any jail or prison on the date of election;
- a member has been declared by a court of competent jurisdiction to be incompetent (except when they are accompanied by their guardian to the polls or provide reasonable verification from their guardian that they have the mental faculties to vote at this particular time, and the Election Board Judge for that polling site has approved the member to vote in such election); or
- a member shows signs of impairment or being under the influence at the polls on the election day, and the Election Board Judge for that polling site determines either that member is too incapacitated to vote, or is disrupting other voters and staff at the election poll.

NON-RESIDENT VOTERS – DECLARING A HOME DISTRICT

- Your Home District is determined by your district of origin, lineage, ancestry or the area of the community you identify with.
- Non-resident voters shall declare only one (1) Home District, either Dist. I (Salt River) or Dist. II (Lehi).
- Non-resident voters shall declare their Home District by submitting a Non-Resident Application for Declaring a Home District for Community Elections form. Forms are available at the Community Development Department or Administration Department.

ABSENTEE BALLOT REQUESTS & DEADLINES

A SRPMIC voter who is unable to vote at the polls on Election day can request a ballot to be mailed to them, if requested by the set **DEADLINES** of:

- **For the PRIMARY ELECTION: October 1, 2026**
- **For the GENERAL ELECTION: October 29, 2026**

STANDING ABSENTEE LIST

Per section 3-4(b)(3): “A nonresident may request to be placed on the standing absentee ballot list...”. If you would like to start receiving SRPMIC election ballots **automatically** for any SRPMIC elections, now and in the future, contact the Council Secretary Office.

VOTING DISTRICTS & POLL SITES

SRPMIC identification required to vote.

Vote at your declared district polling site:

- **District I (Salt River)** members who reside West of North Mesa Drive vote at the Salt River Community Building.
- **District II (Lehi)** members who reside East of North Mesa Drive vote at the Lehi Community Building.

If you're unsure of your declared district polling site, contact the Office of Membership (480) 362-7600.

If you've moved, submit a Change of Address form to the Office of Membership at least fifteen (15) days prior to an election.

HOME VOTING REQUESTS & DEADLINES

An eligible voter who is disabled or bedridden can request to vote at home or a care center (within 25 mile radius). A ballot will be brought to you for voting, if requested by the **DEADLINES** of:

- **For the PRIMARY ELECTION: October 15, 2026**
- **For the GENERAL ELECTION: November 12, 2026**

CANDIDATE QUALIFICATIONS

Per the SRPMIC Constitution Article IV, Sections 2 & 3, candidate qualifications:

- An enrolled member of the SRPMIC.
- Has physically resided in the SRPMIC for at least one(1) year and in the district as provided in Article V, Section 1 for at least six (6) months immediately preceding the election date.
- Is at least 25 years of age.
- Per the amended SRPMIC Constitution, candidates must not have been convicted of a felony during the ten (10) years preceding the date of the election. A felony is any criminal offense punishable by more than one (1) year incarceration in the jurisdiction the person was convicted. *NOTE: The background check will be conducted via the SRPMIC Human Resources Dept. process.*

WILL THERE BE WRITE-IN CANDIDATES?

Per Chapter 3, Section 3-5, (d)(5), Write-In candidates will only be allowed in the Primary Election, unless a Primary Election was not held or if a candidate is running unopposed.

WILL CANDIDATES HAVE TO TAKE LEAVE FROM EMPLOYMENT?

Yes, candidates who work for the SRPMIC government, its enterprises or divisions, must take at least two weeks off prior to the Primary Election; if the candidate continues on to the General Election, he/she must again take two weeks off prior to the General Election. (Annual leave or Leave Without pay may be utilized.) This requirement does not apply to sitting Council Members.

ARE COUNCIL ELECTS ALLOWED TO WORK FOR SRPMIC or ITS ENTERPRISES?

No, candidates elected as President, Vice-President, or Council Members cannot work for the Community government, its enterprises or divisions.

NOMINATIONS

MEETING PROCEDURES

- President and Vice-President nominations are held jointly.
- Council Member nominations are held simultaneously at each District.
- Candidates must be nominated in the District they are registered.
- Persons that nominate a candidate must be an enrolled member and eligible voter of SRPMIC and must be either a resident of the particular district or their home district must be the same as the district in which the candidate is nominated to represent.
- A Nomination Meeting Chairperson will recognize and acknowledge the eligible voter before a nomination can be made.
- The floor will remain open until all individuals have had the opportunity to make their nomination.
- After all nominations have been recognized, the meeting will close.

NOMINEE DEADLINES TO ACCEPT OR DECLINE

Nominees for President, Vice-President, and Council Members must accept or decline their nominations within two (2) business days.

DEADLINE for President, Vice-President:
July 30, 2026, by 5 P.M.

DEADLINE for Council Members:
August 3, 2026, by 5 P.M.

Accept or Decline forms can be picked up from and returned to Erica Harvier, Council Secretary, at the SRPMIC Administration Office, (480) 362-7466.

When accepting a nomination, candidates also agree to a voluntary assignment of \$200 from their next general welfare payment, should their signs not be removed in the required timeframe.

CERTIFICATION OF NOMINEES

The Election Board will certify nominees to run as a candidate for the upcoming Primary Election to take place on Tuesday, October 20, 2026. The certification will be pending a final clearance of a background check. See Article I, Sec.3-5(a)(2) of the Community's Code of Ordinances. *Note: A follow-up letter will be mailed to candidates after the background check has been received and accepted by the Election Board.*

CAMPAIGNING

WHEN & WHERE

Candidate campaigning is allowed during the Primary and General Elections, however no campaigning will be allowed at the polling sites on the day of each Election. Contact the Community Relations Office for information on the Election Day identified campaign area.

PERMISSIBLE CONDUCT

Per Chapter 3, Section 3-147, (1)-(5) the following acts are not considered to be violations of this article:

- Providing transportation to the voting polls for any voter;
- Providing food, campaign literature or items of nominal value at a political rally or gathering on any date preceding election day, so long as the rally is open to the public;
- Providing food, campaign literature or items of nominal value at a designated political campaign demonstration area on the day of an election so long as such food or literature is open to all and is not forced upon or denied to any person;
- Making any campaign promise that does not conflict with section 3-121(d), or violate any law of the Community; or
- Use of Community buildings to hold campaign meetings or rallies, in accordance with tribal building and administrative procedures.

SIGNAGE

Per Chapter 3, Section 3-5, (b)(4)(e) of the SRPMIC Code of Ordinances, campaign signs put up by a candidate or their supporters must be removed within seven (7) business days after the relevant election, or a \$200 fee will be assessed. The \$200 fee pays for the removal of such signs.

Posting signs on private property requires the permission of the homeowner and/or landowner(s).

BIO & PHOTOS

CAMPAIGNING ON ELECTION DAYS

The Community Relations Office shall identify a campaign area at each polling place; note:

- The campaign area is for candidates, or sponsors of an initiative or referendum, to campaign at by providing food, campaign literature or other items to voters and supporters.
- The candidate, or sponsors, may set up a table(s) with chairs, tent(s), and/or a food stand(s) within the identified area.
- The campaign area shall be placed in a manner so as not to impede traffic, create a public safety hazard, jeopardize the integrity of the voting process or block voters from the polling place.

VIOLATION OF ELECTION PROCESS

Per Chapter 3, Sec. 3-148, it is a civil offense for any individual or group of individuals to knowingly attempt to circumvent any Community election or voting rule, requirement, regulation, procedure or law as set forth in the Community Code of Ordinances, regulations and/or election board guidelines or procedures.

VIOLATIONS BY ACTIONS OF CANDIDATES OR ISSUE SUPPORTERS

Per Chapter 3, Sec. 3-149, (a)-(h) violations include:

- Coercion of voter/supporter.
- False statements/misrepresentation.
- Interference with or corruption of election official.
- Bribery of voter.
- Intimidation of Community member employees by employer
- Campaigning in and around the workplace during Community business hours, except for Community schools.
- Use of Community property for election campaigning.
- Campaigning in and around community school buildings and campus.

PENALTIES

Per Sec. 3-152, Civil penalties. Any person who is found guilty of a provision in this article may be fined an amount not to exceed \$5,000.00 per civil offense.

FORUMS

WHAT IS A FORUM?

A candidate forum is a public event where candidates running for a SRPMIC Council office are invited to express their positions on SRPMIC issues.

WHO CAN ATTEND A FORUM?

Eligible SRPMIC voters are encouraged to attend forums to ask questions of the candidates.

CANDIDATE GUIDELINES

- All candidates will make their presentation in a panel setting with a Moderator present.
- Each candidate will have two (2) minutes for an opening statement.
- Candidate response to questions will be limited to two (2) minutes.
- Each candidate will have two (2) minutes for a closing statement.
- A Prompter will be seated up front with time cards at 1 minute and 30 seconds to ensure responses are met within the set time.
- Candidates who will be absent during the Community forums may have a statement read by the forum Moderator or a person of their choosing, so long as adequate notification is provided to Community Relations (at least 24-hour notice). Should a candidate request this process they must provide Community Relations with the individual's name, contact number and copy of the statement. The statement shall be no longer than two (2) minutes for Primary forums & five (5) minutes for General forums.
- A table will be available for candidate campaign materials. (i.e.: fliers, brochures, promotional items, etc.). First come, first serve basis.

ATTENDEE GUIDELINES

- Individuals addressing the candidates will follow a sign-up process.
- Questions should relate to issues and not be of a malicious (attacking) nature.
- Community members asking more than one question shall be considerate of others wishing to address candidates.

ARE FORUMS HELD JOINTLY FOR ALL COUNCIL POSITIONS?

No. Forums are scheduled separately for President, Vice-President, and Council Members, with forums held in both districts. See next page for dates.

CONDUCT OF ELECTIONS

(SEC. 3-6)

(a) Primary elections.

(1) Primary election for offices of the president and vice-president. On the third Tuesday of October during election years when the positions of the president and vice-president are being elected, a primary election shall be held if there are more than two certified candidates running for the office of either the president or the vice-president.

- a. If there are only two certified candidates running for the office of the president or vice-president, respectively, then there shall be no primary election for that specific office.
- b. At the primary election, the method of voting and canvassing of ballots shall be made in the same manner as provided for in this article.
- c. Once the council has certified the election results and the challenge period is over, the two persons having the largest number of votes for the office of the president and/or the vice-president shall be entitled to have their name placed on the official ballot at the ensuing general election.
- d. Primary elections are not held when there is a special election to fill the Office of the president or vice-president.
- e. If there is a tied vote among more than two candidates, and one of the candidate's names would be eliminated because of this tied vote, then all the names of the tied candidates shall appear on the general ballot.

(2) Primary election for offices of council members. On the third Tuesday of October during election years when positions for council members are being elected, a primary election shall be held if any of the requirements in subsection (a) of this section are met.

a. Holding of primary election.

- i. If there is one council member seat that will be elected during a general election, then the two persons having the largest numbers of votes for that office shall have their name placed on the official ballot of the next general election.
- ii. If there are two council member seats that will be elected during a general election, then the four persons having the largest number of votes for that office shall have their name placed on the official ballot of the next general election.
- iii. If there are three council member seats that will be elected during a general election, then the five persons having the largest number of votes for that office shall have their name placed on the official ballot of the next general election.
- iv. If there are four council member seats that will be elected during a general election, then the six persons having the largest number of votes for that office shall have their name placed on the official ballot of the next general election.
- v. If there are five or more council member seats that will be elected during a general election, then the eight persons having the largest number of votes for that office shall have their name placed on the official ballot of the next general election.

b. No primary election held.

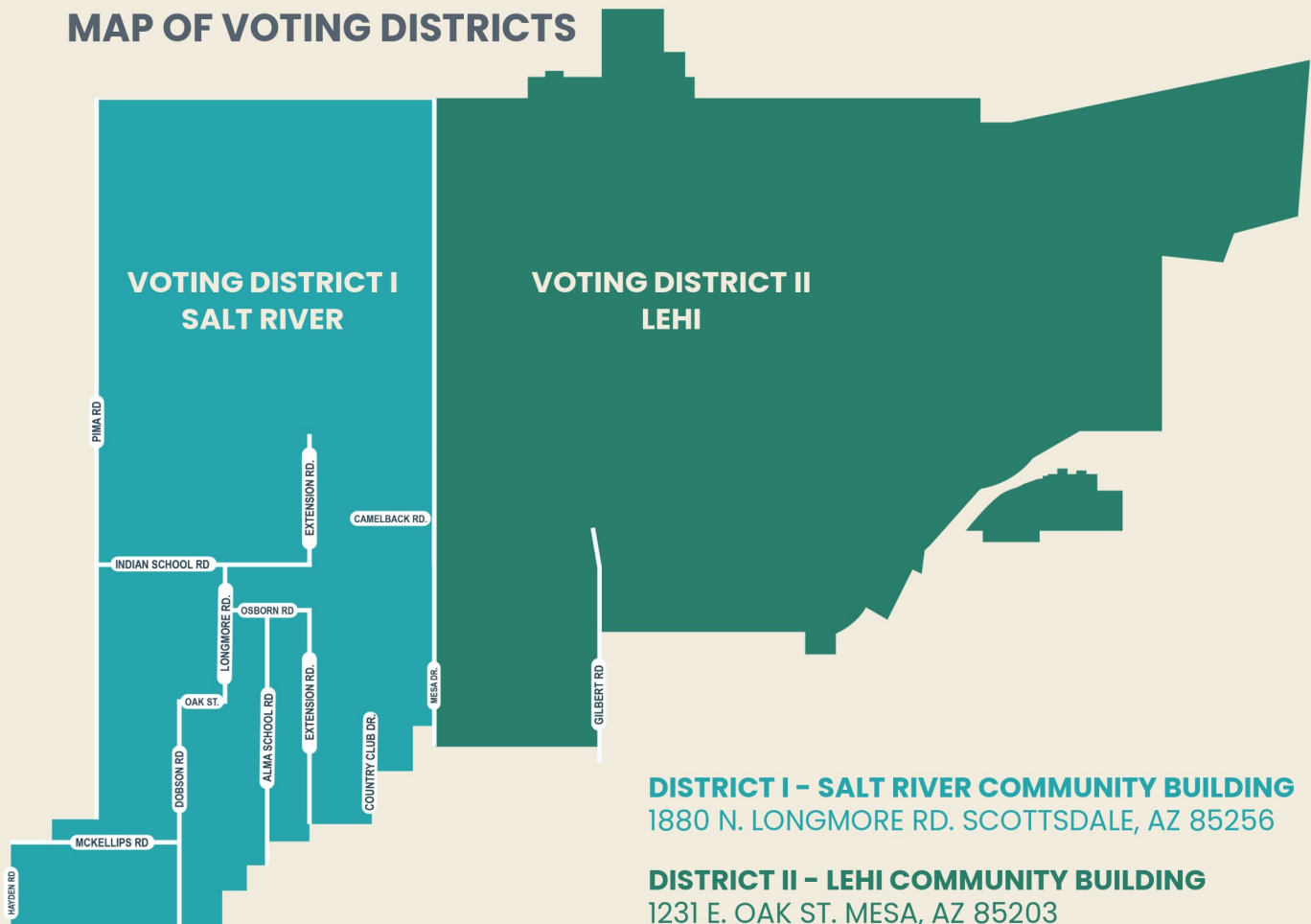
- i. If the number of certified candidates running for the office of council member meet or are under the amount listed in subsection (a) of this section, then there shall be no primary election for that specific office or election cycle.
- ii. Primary elections are not held when there is a special election to fill the office of a council member.

CONDUCT OF ELECTIONS

(SEC. 3-6) continued

- c. Tied vote. If there is a tied vote among two or more candidates in the primary election and one of the candidate's names would be eliminated because of this tie, then all the names of the tied candidates shall appear on the general ballot.
 - d. Conduct of the election. At the primary election, the method of voting and canvassing of ballots shall be made in the same manner as provided for in this article.
- (3) Candidate withdrawal or unable to participate in general election. If a candidate who received the necessary amount of votes in the primary election to be placed on the ballot in the general election withdraws or is unable to run for office in the general election, then the candidate with the next highest votes will be placed on the ballot for the general election for that elected office. The general election for that office shall be held no earlier than 30 days and no later than 60 days from the date that Council is notified of the withdrawal at a regular Council meeting.
- (b) General election. General elections for purposes of electing the president, vice-president, and council members shall be held on the third Tuesday in November in each even numbered year. The conduct of such elections shall be governed by this chapter.
